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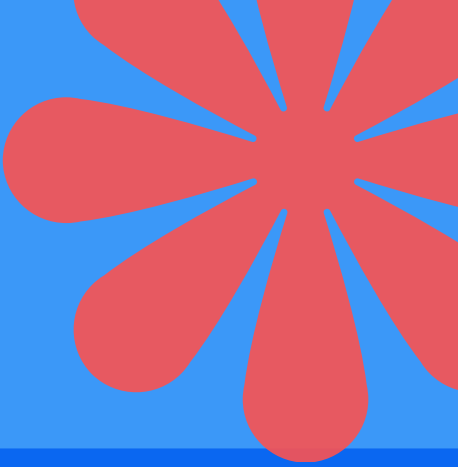

Charting the roadmap for diversified, technology-enabled and professionally managed cooperatives across India.

Cooperatives: From Numbers to Ground-Level Impact

The 8th National Conference on “Sahkar se Samriddhi – From Vision to Ground Reality” was held in Srinagar on 25th and 26th June 2026, bringing together senior officials from States/UTs, Registrars of Cooperative Societies, national federations and key stakeholders to review progress and chart the future roadmap of India’s cooperative sector.

The Conference emphasised the need to move beyond numbers towards quality, accountability, professional management and measurable ground-level impact. Discussions covered technology adoption in cooperative banks, sustainability and circularity initiatives, data-driven governance through National Cooperative Database 2.0, and strengthening infrastructure under the World’s Largest Grain Storage Plan.

THE FOCUS - EXPAND •
DIVERSIFY • DIGITALISE •
DELIVER

The deliberations placed strong emphasis on building vibrant, professionally managed and technology-enabled cooperatives capable of creating greater economic opportunities and delivering better services at the grassroots.

KEY MESSAGE:

The cooperative movement must move from expansion in numbers to measurable impact on the ground.

5 KEY TAKEAWAYS

What emerged from the National Conference?

01 | EXPANDING THE COOPERATIVE BASE

Discussions focused on expanding India's cooperative base through the formation of new multipurpose PACS, dairy and fishery cooperatives in uncovered Panchayats. The Conference also highlighted the role of cooperatives in building agri-infrastructure and strengthening cooperative institutions at the grassroots.

02 | PACS AS DIVERSIFIED ECONOMIC INSTITUTIONS

States shared models and case studies of PACS undertaking multiple business activities, along with new opportunities for diversification.

The deliberations underlined that diversified, professionally managed and technology-enabled PACS can become vibrant economic institutions in rural areas.

03 | BUILDING NATIONAL VALUE CHAINS

The Conference focused on future-oriented approaches to building national value chains through new-age national cooperatives such as NCEL, NCOL and BBSSL.

Emphasis was placed on strengthening cooperative-led models in exports, organic products and seeds, while improving linkages between producers, institutions, markets and consumers.

04 | DIGITAL TRANSFORMATION & AI

Digital transformation, data-driven decision-making and emerging technologies, including AI, were identified as important areas of focus.

The emphasis was on moving beyond computerisation towards intelligent, transparent and responsive systems that support better governance, service delivery and planning.

05 | FROM DISCUSSION TO ACTION

National federations were called upon to prepare State-specific implementation plans and closely monitor their execution.

The Conference concluded with actionable priorities and six-month targets for States/UTs, with greater coordination between national institutions, federations and States/UTs to address field-level challenges and improve outcomes.

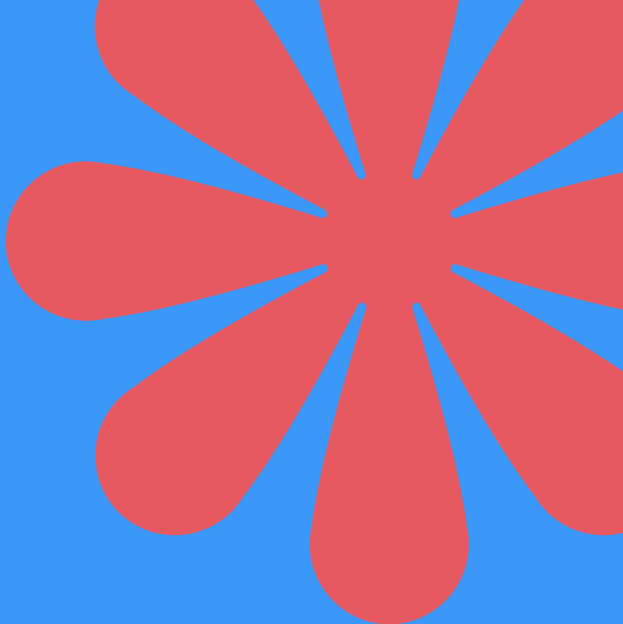
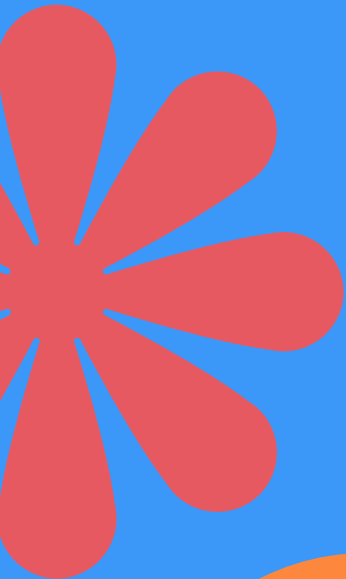

2 Select Online Service



Go to "Online Services" and select "Registration of New Cooperative Society (Section 8)".

3 Register Chief Promoter



User Registration form of Chief Promoter will appear. Enter all the requisite details of the Chief Promoter.

4 Verification & User ID



After verification of Chief Promoter details, the Department will allot User ID to the Chief Promoter through SMS.

5 Login & Inform Department



Chief Promoter will login through his/her User ID and inform the Department regarding conduction of the Organization Meeting.

6 Conduct Organisation Meeting



After informing the Department, conduct the Organization Meeting for registration of new Cooperative Society.

7 Fill Online Application (Form 3)



After the organization meeting, fill up the online application form (Form 3) with all required details (see list below).

8 Upload Required Documents



Upload all necessary documents (see checklist below) and submit the application.

9 Department Scrutiny



The Department will scrutinize and verify the application and documents.

10 Registration Process



On successful verification, further action will be taken for registration of the Cooperative Society.

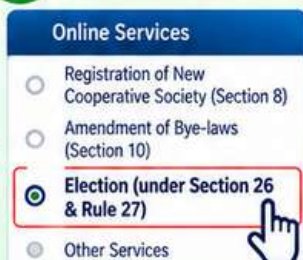

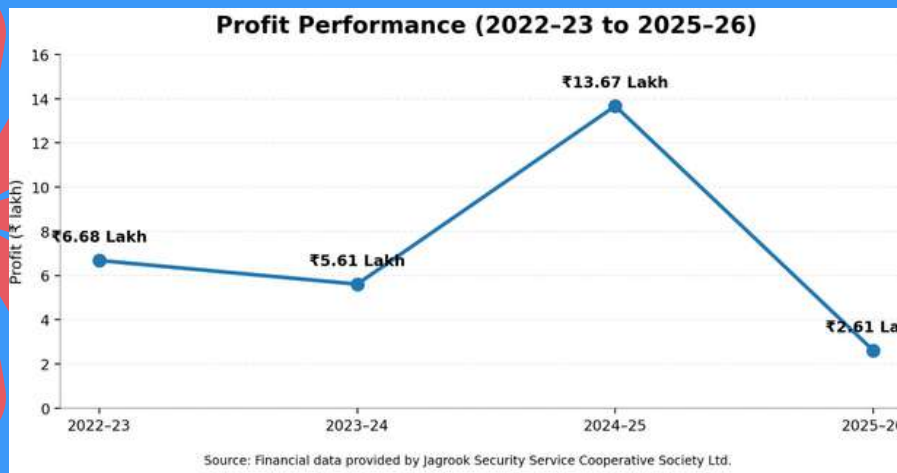

Established in 2002, Jagrook Security Service Cooperative Society Ltd. is the first security service and manpower agency in the Andaman & Nicobar Islands.

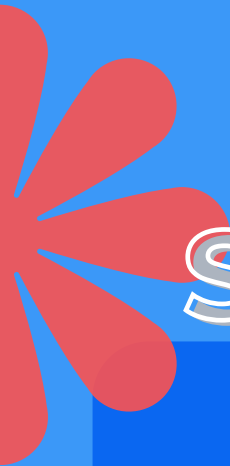

A NEW CHAPTER IN COOPERATIVE DIVERSIFICATION

Campbell Bay Multipurpose Cooperative Society Ltd. has diversified its activities by establishing a coconut oil extraction unit. The initiative brings procurement, processing and marketing closer to local farmers, helping the Society move beyond conventional credit activities towards a multipurpose, farmer-oriented cooperative model.

The first procurement and processing cycle

During its first procurement cycle, the Society procured 2,000 mature coconuts, processed 425 kg of copra and produced 212.5 litres of coconut oil. The finished product is sold locally through the Society's Common Service Centre (CSC).

The unit is operated by three employees, while the Society has also started generating additional activity through coconut oil extraction services and the sale of coconut oil cake as a by-product.

- **Membership & Participation:** Out of 203 members, 25 local farmers participated in the first procurement cycle.
- **Production & Yield:** The unit procured 2,000 mature coconuts, processing 425 kg of copra to produce 212.5 litres of coconut oil.
- **Operations & Sales:** Three employees manage processing and operations, while the final product is sold locally through the Society's Common Service Centre (CSC).

The initiative has also started generating non-credit income through coconut oil extraction services and the sale of coconut oil cake as a by-product. From 19 March to 5 September 2026, the Society earned income from copra grinding/extraction services, while the sale of coconut oil cake generated additional revenue, taking the reported income from these activities to ₹16,080.

Grand inauguration of oil mill at Campbell Bay marks boost to local economy



CAMPBELL BAY, MARCH 19— In a significant step towards strengthening local infrastructure, the South Indian Cooperative Society Ltd. (SICSS), Lakshadweep, successfully inaugurated the grand inauguration of the newly established oil mill at the Exclusive Beach, Jodhpur Nagar, in Campbell Bay.

The inaugural ceremony was presided by the Executive Director, Lakshadweep, who was assisted by the Chief Clerk and formally inaugurated the mill. The Chief Clerk also

addressed the presence of the Assistant Director (Chief), Campbell Bay, as the guest of honour, who represented the initiative taken by the society in establishing the oil mill, emphasising its role in supporting local farmers and enhancing value addition to agricultural produce.

Adding further importance to the occasion, officials including the Assistant Director of Cooperative Societies and the Executive Director of Cooperative Societies were present, acknowledging their support and encouragement to the initiative.

Several dignitaries and local representatives, including Prashant, Upendranath, Jitha Prashant, Nandhan, and others, were also present. The presence of the Board of Directors of the society also

participated in the inauguration, marking the event as a collective achievement of the community.

The newly inaugurated oil mill is expected to provide a major boost to local farmers by facilitating processing facilities within the vicinity, reducing transportation and storage costs, and creating new employment opportunities.
